

March 13 - March 18



March 31


The Easter Bunny is making a stop at Regina Library! Find candy-filled treats all around the inside of the building. Event co-sponsored by the Rivier Student Government Association.



Staff Pick of the Month

You may know Andrew Ross Sorkin from his daily work as a CNBC anchor. His new work, *1929*, is a gripping, detail-rich account of the most infamous economic crash in history. It weaves together meticulous research—eight years' worth—into a vivid narrative that unfolds chronologically across key dates leading into, through, and beyond the crash.



The biggest difference from other works on the subject is Sorkin's laser focus on the characters of 1929. One can't help but see similarities between more recent economic events such as the dotcom bust and the great financial crisis of 2008, leading one to think that human nature hasn't changed all that much.
